Chaz D. told the audience, "When I am anxious, I walk very slowly and when I first started here I was the slowest kid in the school. As time went by I started moving a little faster. Now I am the first person to enter my homeroom!"

Many students spoke about the workplace and social skills they cultivated. Katie M. shared, "The Calais School prepared me for the future by showing so much about my own talents. I have learned how to be more independent, to be responsible on the job, how to interact with others, and make lots of friends."

Student Mentors Work with Canine Volunteers



This summer, Janice Wolfe and her Merlin's Kids volunteers brought a new animal experience to The Calais School. Ms. Butler and Ms. Ferment helped Merlin's Kids volunteers introduce a 5-week student mentor program to incorporate the summer theme of Community and Responsibility with our volunteer canines. Having the dogs in the classroom helped promote a calm, relaxed, and fun atmosphere for our ESY students.

Students in grades 8 through 12Plus were chosen to mentor younger students throughout the summer. They completed a course on how to foster appropriate social skills, how to be positive role models, and how to interact with younger students. The mentors also studied canine care and behavior

to help them incorporate the dogs into their mentor experience.

Working with service dogs provides positive reinforcement and emotional support to students. Our service dog, Cali, is trained to adapt to the needs of each individual Calais student. She helps students with anger management, anger diffusion, and conflict resolution and gives all students unconditional love and support.






Calais Receives Grants for Chromebooks in the Classroom
